T.F. football teams to play for Autism Speaks

Estimates from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention indicate that one in 88 children has been identified as having autism spectrum disorder, representing a 23 percent increase since 2009.

Staff from T.F. North and South high schools have organized a series of fundraisers and events to bring greater awareness to autism. This initiative is led by T.F. North teacher and football coach Mike Anaclerio, whose sister, Mary Anaclerio, was diagnosed with autism as a child and passed away in October 2012 at age 41 from colon cancer.

Throughout the week of Oct. 14 raffle tickets will be available for purchase and autism awareness T-shirts will be sold to students for \$5 and \$10 for faculty to benefit the Mary's Piece of the Puzzle fundraiser. At 6:45 p.m. Oct. 18, the T.F. North and South football teams will play against one another in a charity football game at T.F. South, 18500 Burnham Ave.

Players from both schools will wear autism awareness puzzle stickers on their helmets and blue socks, shoe strings, and wristbands. Proceeds from the Mary's Piece of the Puzzle fundraiser will be donated in Mary's name and will benefit the nonprofit organization Autism Speaks.
