T.F. North's faculty crushes students (again) in annual Monogram game

On Friday, May 2nd, TFN's Monogram Club held its annual game against the faculty. It was sponsored by Mr. Schuldes and Mr. Pignatello. Unlike previous years, a volleyball game was held first followed by the basketball game. This was the first time TFN had ever held a volleyball game for the annual Monogram Club event. The student volleyball team consisted of Liliana Krueger, Liliana Alfaro, Alejandra Nevaro-Vazquez, Sammie King, Alana Dotson, Isabella Rosales, Anaiya Malone, Alexandra Saenz, and Luis Prieto. They played against the teacher's team consisting of Mr. Moore, Ms. Pittman, Ms. Schuldes, and Ms. Rising. TFN alumni Jose Gonzalez and Samiya Smith also participated in the volleyball game, playing alongside the teachers. The volleyball game ended with the faculty winning by a landslide with a score of 15-7. "I had a great time. 
Final thoughts from our soon-to-be graduates OPINION
